### Recommendation, Decision, and Appeal

- AFDCB recommendation to CO
- Written notice of CO decision
- Appeal decision "at any time," to AFDCB President
- AFDCB
  - Recommends approval / denial
  - May conduct additional investigation


### Business Responses to AFDCB

  - Change name, location, ownership, business filings


